The Vine and the Branches John 15:1-8

Leader: I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener.

Congregation: He cuts off every branch in me that bears no fruit, while every branch that does bear fruit he prunes so that it will be even more fruitful.

Leader: You are already clean because of the word I have spoken to you.

About Rev. Dr. Renita J. Weems, PhD.

Dr. Renita J. Weems is a biblical scholar, an academic administrator, a writer, a blogger, an ordained minister, and a public intellectual whose scholarly insights into modern faith, biblical texts, and the role of spirituality in everyday lives make her a much sought after writer and speaker.

making her the first African American woman to do so.



Dr. Weems is the author of several widely-acclaimed books on women's spirituality and wholeness: "Just A Sister Away" (1987 & 2005), "I Asked for Intimacy" (1993), "Showing Mary: How Women Can Share Prayers, Wisdom, and the Blessings of God" (2003), and, "What Matters Most: Ten Passionate Lessons from the Song of Solomon" (2004). Her 1999 book, "Listening for God: A Minister's Journey through Silence and Doubt" (Simon & Schuster), won the Religious Communicators' Council's prestigious 1999 Wilbur Award for "excellence in communicating spiritual values to the secular media". Ordained an elder in the AME Church since 1984, Dr. Weems is a former member of the faculty of Vanderbilt University and former William & Camille Cosby Visiting Professor at Spelman College. As a scholar she has numerous books, commentaries and articles on the bible and prophetic religion to her credit. In 2008, Yale University invited Dr. Weems to give the prestigious Lyman Beecher Lecture,

Upon her graduation in 1989 from Princeton Theological Seminary Dr. Weems became the first African-American woman to earn a Ph.D. in Old Testament. In the 2008 publication of the book, "Black Stars: African American Religious Leaders", a collection of biographies of some of the most important Black Religious Leaders over the last 200 hundred years, Dr. Weems is featured among such impressive figures as Adam Clayton Powell, Elijah Muhammad, Sojourner Truth, Howard Thurman, and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Dr. Weems has been happily married for twenty-five years to Rev. Martin L. Espinosa. He is Executive Pastor and she Co-Pastor of a blessed inner-city ministry in east Nashville, Ray Of Hope Community Church. They are the proud parents of a daughter, Savannah Nia. Dr. Weems spends her spare time quilting and is a founding member of Zuri Quilting Guild of Middle Tennessee. When she's not quilting, Dr. Weems acts as Vice-President and Academic Dean at American Baptist College (Nashville, TN).
